
Dave in Thailand ...

# Koh Ha - Rok December 2020





- used Agoda and google, and made a good decision, a very nice resort, nice location, and good prices - two nights for about  $2800\,\mathrm{baht}$ 







My EXCELLENT bungalow was right about here, completely clear view to the beach maybe 50 yards from the small seawall in front of the beach






- garden bungalows, very nice and well kept place - and Mrs Riem (I think) below, very friendly manager ...



- time for a bit of a tour around Saladan, pick up a few supplies ...

second stop around here

- and to the beach at park HQ for lunch and relaxing, but there was black stuff all over the place that looked like coral, and I did not come on the trip to sit on the beach, so 3rd snorkel for me along here -

[this is an OLD google maps pic - there is a long dock made from plastic blocks of some kind out into the water now, as here -





- some pics from the first snorkel - from the amazing Nikon coolpix - within seconds after getting into the water I knew I was in for a good snorkel, good healthy coral everywhere, lots of fish - just a few highlights -



- nice healthy table (blue) and rock / boulder coral - and note the little blue thing top right - a 'christmas tree worm' - haven't seen these in a long time - all over the place here! more later

common pink starfish haven't seen many of these lately (yes they usually have 5 arms, this guy missing one)










- some kind of knobby brown coral, nice and healthy - this stuff is really hard to identify ..



as common as the 'nemo' clownfish or anemonefish in many places, this is the skunk anemonefish - named for long white stripe along its back like a skunk



longtail bannerfish, quite common longer tail and usually a bit bigger than the Moorish idol which otherwise looks about the same





nice big healthy table coral



nice Acropora coral in some hard coral - note little yellow fish swimning inside for protection (and the amazing ability of the Nikon!!)







some form of star coral, quite common


Montastrea coral




oops strayed a bit far from the boat in this beautiful coral garden, and time to head back, I'm usually the last one back to the boat ...

- a bit of fire coral (common some places, not here) under a big beautiful big healthy bit of rock coral



- and the first snorkel over - but very nice, very impressed -

and hardly in the water, just swimming away from the crowd around the boat, and looked around - and there it was - the crown of thorns starfish, said to be very dangerous for eating a lot of coral, but they are very rare in my experience around the Andaman, first I've seen in many years

- and more nice healthy rock coral, a bunch of the very common 'sargeant major' fish swimming along - the ones who swim around people giving them bread or something



and another crown of thorns! - a bit deep, so hard to get a good pic .. the Fuji is not as good as the Nikon with the color management at deeper depths (over a meter or so)



- nice piece of Plate and pillar coral (Porites monticulosa) - again very healthy etc





spadefish, or batfish, another pretty rare thing for me, so watched for awhile - a bit far away so pics not great ..

a green acropora with some fish - and showing how lovely the pics from the underwater Fuji can be at lesser depths



striped surgeonfish - not too common most places I've been



nice scene, healthy green acropora and rock coral, little fishes swimming around



- time to go again, time goes so fast when you are over a healthy reef looking at an endless variety of amazing things



- and coming ashore at the park ranger station, where we were having lunch and a break



lunch - the guy on the left is the trip guide - nice guy






monitor wandering around checking things out - not too big, a meter or so - I did not move, and he almost walked right over my foot - interesting creatures, and very brave, I guess they are protected here, which is good of course

- 3rd trip at Koh Rok, in front of park, starting from the end of the dock

- and only in the water a few seconds before this barracuda swims by!!! not ready - a quick pic as he is heading for deeper water (thus the not great quality) - so many things happen like this when snorkeling, when least expected something interesting happens -





a lot of this 'turbinaria' disc coral out in front, pretty stuff, many many shapes and patterns it is found in - and healthy, like everything here -




- I think the 'elkhorn' coral, thicker than staghorn - but not sure, some of this stuff is VERY hard to identify



never seen before


moon wrasse, fairly common reef fish

3rd Crown of Thorns in one day!! giant clam




bit of fire coral





- a few blue and pink stars












- so many nice scenes, these with the powder blue surgeon fish and longtail bannerfish  $\,$ 









- some variety of parrotfish above by the seastar - quite a few of these around, did not get any good pics

nice big patch of purple encrusting something, again hard to identify clearly  $\dots$ 




- a porcupine fish, not as common as the puffer fish I first thought it was, until I saw it raising its spines for which it is named and had the 'aha!!' moment ...
